### Christian Action

Canon John Collins, sets up **Christian Action** with the initial objective of promoting reconciliation in post-war Europe. Through CA, Collins raises funds to support families of **ANC Defiance Campaign** activists imprisoned for non-violent protests against South Africa's apartheid government.

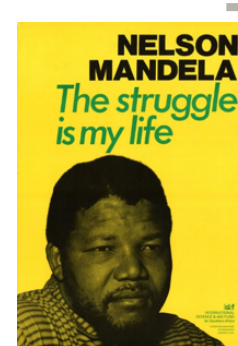
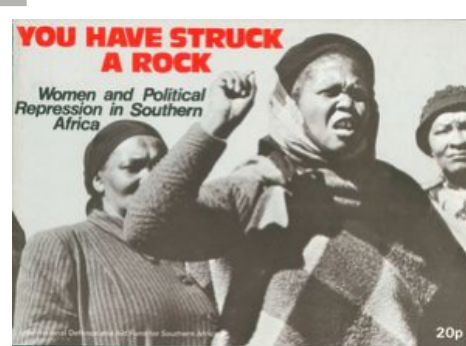
### The British Defence and Aid Fund

Canon Collins merges various Christian Action funds raising money for South African anti-apartheid activities into the new **British Defence and Aid Fund for Southern Africa (BDAF)**.



Over a period of 25 years, £100 million was smuggled into South Africa to help fund the legal costs of political trials and support the dependants of those opposing apartheid. In this way IDAF made a vital contribution to ending apartheid."

### LRC

Legal Resources Centre

The **Legal Resources Centre** is established by lawyers and activists, including Arthur Chaskalson and Felicia Kentridge. LRC lawyers represent individuals arrested under pass law infractions and challenge forced removals and detention without trial. They become instrumental in dismantling much of the legal architecture of apartheid.

### Legal Assistance Trust

The **Legal Assistance Trust** is founded to raise money in the UK to support the work of the Legal Resources Centre.

### Mandela's Release and Expansion

Following the release of Nelson Mandela, **CCETSA** extends its work to ten SADC countries. Scholars start returning to southern Africa and become engaged in social justice work.



1994

### Giyani Science Centre

In the year of South Africa's first democratic elections, CCETSA begins funding the **Giyani Science Centre**, implementing a project to improve the standard of mathematics and science education in the province of Limpopo, which has been starved of quality education throughout the apartheid era.



### Educational Trust for Southern Africa

Canon Collins and IDAF colleague Ethel de Keyser set up a trust to fund exiled activists and their children to study in the UK and other countries, acquiring the knowledge and skills they need to contribute to the new democracies predicted to emerge in southern Africa. After Collins' death, the organisation is renamed **Canon Collins Educational Trust for Southern Africa**.

### International Defence and Aid Fund and Rivonia Trial

BDAF is reconstituted as the **International Defence and Aid Fund (IDAF)**, with Canon Collins serving as President. Branches are formed in Britain, New Zealand, Scandinavia, Holland and India. IDAF pays the legal costs for defendants of the **Rivonia Trial**, in which Nelson Mandela is convicted of Treason and sentenced to life imprisonment.

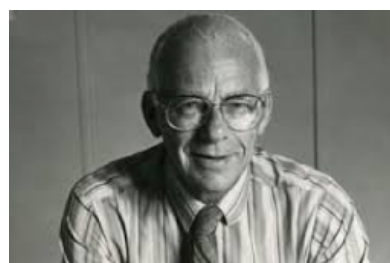
### Treason Trial Defence Fund

After his first visit to South Africa in 1954, Canon Collins launches the **Treason Trial Defence Fund** to raise money to pay the legal fees of 156 anti-apartheid activists, including Chief Albert Luthuli and Nelson Mandela.

CCELAT partners with **Wits Justice Project**, an investigative journalism organisation researching human rights abuses and challenging miscarriages of justice.



CCELAT partners with **Equal Education**, a movement of learners, parents, teachers and community members working for quality and equality in South African education, through analysis and activism.

**The Scholars' Scholar Award is launched.** Funded by CCELAT alumni, it is awarded annually to an exceptional individual who embodies the Trust's vision of an open and just society.

### Adolescent Girls Literacy Project

CCETSA supports the **Adolescent Girls Literacy Project (AGLIT)** in Malawi to implement an education, literacy and sexual health programme to address the high rate of adolescent girls dropping out of school.

### Phelophepa Health Train

CCETSA partners with the **Phelophepa Health Train** to bring dedicated mobile teams of health professionals to poor, rural South Africans.

### Nelson Mandela Scholarships

Established in partnership with Unilever to develop leadership capacity in previously disadvantaged communities.

CCETSA merges with the **Legal Assistance Trust (LAT)** to become the **Canon Collins Educational and Legal Assistance Trust (CCELAT)**.

2014
